

# Board Announces Memorial Brick Sidewalk Campaign

At their May 18 meeting, the Board of Trustees kicked off the planning for the 25th anniversay celebration of the Heymann Historical Society by approving a campaign to install a memorial brick sidewalk at the Church. The Society, formed in December 1981, will celebrate the 25th anniversary in 2006. Specific activities honoring the anniversary will be scheduled and announced at a later date.

The goal of the Trustees is to install a brick sidewalk leading up to the front steps of the church in the summer of 2004. The deteriorating steps will be replaced, and a new handrail and lanscaping installed.

HHS members will have the opportunity to purchase a memorial brick for the sidewalk. Each brick will have 3 lines, with 14 spaces each, available for engraving. The Board set a price of \$50 for HHS members to purchase and engrave each brick. The proceeds from the sale of the memorial bricks will be used to support ongoing maintenace of the Church.

The Board is excited about this campaign and the significant upgrade the memorial brick sidewalk will provide to the church property. The November newsletter will

contain an order form for the memorial bricks. If you have any questions about this campaign, please contact any HHS Trustee.

In other news, the Board approved the development of two new gifts for sale: a collector plate series and a Heymann Historical Society afghan "throw". Jackie Hyman is working on contacting suppliers and collecting the art work and pictures for each type of gift. The goal is to be able to offer these items for purchase in time for the Holidays. Proceeds from the sale support the restoration and maintenance of the Church and Friendship Hall.

Trustees Chase Heyman, Matthew Heyman, and Lou Zorn, members of a committe studying the issue of upgrades to Friendship Hall, were scheduled to meet the week after the Board meeting to further discuss the issue.

We welcome your comments on this issue and appreciate your continued support.

# A National Historic District Property

First organized on August 14, 1858 as the German Evangelical Reformed Church, the congregation moved into a newly built Hunt's Corners Church building in 1866. In 1982 the remaining members of the congregation transferred the deed to the Heymann Historical Society to allow for preservation of the building. On September 2, 1993 the Hunt's Corners district was added to the National Register of Historic Places by the National Park Service, United States Department of the Interior.

# From Our Cousin In Germany

We visited the Bed & Breakfast House (Angel Welcome) owned by a friend of Joan and Norma. She decorated all the rooms with angels and angel motifs. Then we visited Schoepfle Garden in Birmingham.

In the evening Joan, Norma and Louis drove with me along Lake Erie. I could see Cedar Point.



May 24th. At 1:30 a.m. Kathy Smith - daughter of Carol - and Rita Zorn-daughter-in-law of Joan - drove us to the depot at Sandusky. The train traveled via Cleveland, Buffalo, Syracuse and Albany to New York. At 2:50 p.m. we reached Penn Station in New York City. After check-in at our hotel and dinner in a Japanese Restaurant we took a tour on a double-decker bus, for our first impressions of this city.

May 25th. On Sunday morning we took a double-decker bus to Battery Park. From there we took the ferry to the Statue of Liberty and to Ellis Island. We toured Liberty Island; the Museum on Ellis Island and saw a film about immigration. At the Wall of Honour we read the name of Philip William Heymann. Back at Battery Park we saw the sculpture 'The Sphere', which stood in the plaza of the World Trade Center. Wall Street also was on our program – the New York Stock Exchange and the Federal Hall National Monument. We went to Ground Zero, St. Paul's Chapel and Trinity Church. In the evening I wished to go to the Empire State Building to have a panoramic view over the town. But when we arrived at the 86th Floor Observatory there were only clouds and we couldn't see anything.

**May 26<sup>th</sup>.** We left New York by train - via Newark and Trenton – to Philadelphia. Our hotel was in the Historic District. We visited Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell Pavilion.

May 27th. We took a Trolley Tour through the town of Philadelphia. In the afternoon we walked to Christ Church and to Betsy Ross House. We attended a theatrical performance about the rise of the first American flag. After dinner in a German restaurant we saw the Lights of Liberty Show.

May 28th. Took the train to Washington. We arrived at 11:30 a.m. at Union Station. In the afternoon we went by metro to the National Zoo. They have two Giant Pandas.

May 29th. Today we took a Trolley Tour through town. First the Old Post Office Tower, then the Ford Theatre, the White House and the National Washington Cathedral. We drove through Georgetown, then to Arlington National Cemetery, where we visited the graves of President John F. Kennedy, his wife Jacqueline and his brother Robert. At the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier we saw the Changing of the Guard. We also saw the Lincoln Memorial, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and the Korean War Veterans Memorial. After dinner Laurel, Duane and I walked to the Capitol Building, the Washington Monument and to the Thomas Jefferson Memorial.

May 30<sup>th</sup>. After breakfast I had to say Good-bye to Carol, Ruth, Laurel and Duane. I went by taxi to the Ronald Reagan Airport, then on to Tampa/Florida. Reva June and Bob Nasby showed me around Sarasota, Turtle Beach and Siesta Beach.

**May 31st.** On Saturday we visited Busch Gardens and later saw a show 'World Rhythms on Ice'. We had dinner at a restaurant with views of zebras and giraffes.


**June 1st.** On Sunday we visited Myakka River State Park and toured in an airboat on Lake Myakka - we saw some alligators. On our way back to Sarasota we stopped at Casey's Pass on the Gulf of Mexico.

**June 2nd.** On Monday Reva June and I visited Bernice and John Meek, in Sebring. On our way we stopped at Lake Placid (Town of Murals) and saw some of the paintings.
