Renewing Family Ties - During Wartime - 86 Years Ago

In 1917, during World War I, descendants of John George Heymann, held their first annual reunion at the Fremont, Ohio fairgrounds, 70 years after son Philip William Heymann first arrived in Ohio. The United States entered the war a few months before the family posed for the picture (below). William Anthony Heyman, instrumental in organizing the first John George Heymann family reunion is pictured, (right), with his mother, Jeannette Scheid Heyman, son, Cecil Heyman, and his granddaughter Willow. Will served as president of the reunion until his death in 1942. (Heymann History and Genealogy, 1560-1997, pages 437- 438, 1182).

First organized on August 14, 1858 as the German Evangelical Reformed Church, the congregation moved into a newly built Hunt's Corners Church building in 1866. In 1982 the remaining members of the congregation transferred the deed to the Heymann Historical Society to allow for preservation of the building. On September 2, 1993 the Hunt's Corners district was added to the National Register of Historic Places by the National Park Service, United States Department of the Interior.

Brigitte Kitschke from Kaltenholzhausen called me just now. She had some information that perhaps should be included in the Newsletter. The group of American Cousins who visited our area in the 1989(Cousins First Trip to Germany) planted a tree (Friendship Tree) in Kaltenholzhausen on May 21, 1989. During the Heymann Cousins Fourth Trip to Germany - when the American and German cousins met in Kaltenholzhausen on June 10, 2001 - there also was a stop at the Friendship Tree.

But now there is sad news about the tree. During a storm last summer the tree was struck by lightning - and a part of the tree broke off. It is necessary to cut the tree down because it will be dangerous. But there is agreement that another tree will be planted on the same spot.

Memorial Brick Sidewalk

The Heymann Historical Society, formed in December 1981, will celebrate the 25th anniversary in 2006. In preparation the Trustees plan to upgrade the Church property by installing a brick sidewalk beginning in the spring of 2004. The deteriorating steps will be replaced, and a new handrail and landscaping installed.

HHS members can purchase a memorial brick for the sidewalk. The red bricks are 4 by 8 inches and will be engraved with uppercase block letters. Each brick will have two lines of text with a maximum of 14 spaces per line, available for engraving. Each space will count as 1 character of the 14 total characters possible per line. The cost to purchase each brick, including the engraving, is \$50. The proceeds from the sale of the memorial bricks will be used to support ongoing maintenance of the Church. Relections on Hunt's Corners: Tribute to Maurice Heyman

Maurie Heyman, Heymann Historical Society Treasurer and Trustee, passed away on August 20, 2003. His term coincided with a period of great accomplishment and growth in the Society, including restoration of the Church (roof, steeple, stained glass windows and other improvements), building of Friendship Hall, release of the updated Heymann Genealogy and the 150th Anniversary Celebration in 1998.

I reviewed many letters and documents that he generated while conducting the business of Treasurer. Below are samples of his writings that I found interesting, enjoyable and descriptive. He will be missed and we extend our sympathies to his wife Polly, son Charles (Chad) Heyman and daughter-in-law Patricia Heyman and daughter Kimberly

(Heyman) Bowman and son-in-law Robert Bowman, and grandchildren, Stacy (Heyman) Horner, Kyle Heyman, Bryan Bowman, and Kailyn Bowman. Grandson Robert James Bowman died December 19, 2000. (See page 616).

Maurie was very proud of the accomplishments of the Society and generous with his praise for the efforts of others. In an October 7, 1995 letter to Reva June and Bob Nasby, he writes, *"I heartily agree with your appraisal that the 9/24 meeting went well and that we're getting a lot accomplished each year. I am just so proud of the way the building is being improved. You can't believe the sentimental value it holds for me. I grew up in it."* He continues, in a second letter to Reva June and Bob Nasby, dated November 18, 1997, *"Several of our relatives and friends living in the Monroeville area have mentioned to Polly and me how nice the Church looks. I think everyone living in the area takes some pride in the improved look of the property and beautification to the area. I know I feel a great pride and satisfaction in what we're doing"*. Finally in an April 17, 1997 letter he praises the efforts of Reva June Nasby regarding the Genealogy project, by commenting *"Polly and I have strong feelings—we know quite well the work you have done compiling this book. Our thanks to you from the bottoms of our hearts. A job well done."*

Polly writes most eloquently about the special commitment he held for the HHS, in an October 26, 2003 letter to me, *"The Heymann Historical Society certainly did mean a lot to him and especially the restoration of the Church. He lived so close to it when he was young and he was baptized and confirmed in that little church. He was proud of that. He enjoyed being Treasurer of the Society and also being one of the Trustees. We both enjoyed the European trips and getting together for Board meetings and seeing everyone."*

"He was in the Navy from August 1941 until October 1945. He went in as a 2nd Class storekeeper and became a Chief Petty Officer about six months after we were married in August 1943. He was at Great Lakes Naval Station for 3 years before he was sent to San Francisco and assigned to a supply ship to take provisions to different areas of the Pacific."

In a letter sent on Pearl Harbor Day, December 7, 1996, to John Seaman, Maurie writes *"I vividly recall 55 years ago today where I was when I heard the news the Japanese had bombed Pearl Harbor—my barracks at Great Lakes Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, Illinois. That night a bunch of us sailors went to the Rink, a dance hall, in Waukegan, in uniform. The girls were happy to dance with us and the civilians were slapping us on the shoulders and buying us beers. Up until December 7, we went in civilian clothes because the girls refused to dance with men in uniform and the bar was closed to us. We were allowed to wear civilian clothes off the base until Mid-February 1942."*

Maurie and Polly were married in 1943 following both of their graduations from Tiffin University in 1939. They enjoyed a 60 year marriage, and

as noted in the following comment, from an August 8, 1996 correspondence, he showed his sense of humor remarking about Polly, *"She just came back from shopping and told me she bought six ears of corn. It is my job to husk it. What was the Peter Principle? Everyone one reaches his level of incompetency!"* Maurie enjoyed his family, remarking in an April 5, 1998 letter about his 80th birthday, *"On Sunday March 8, we had a great day; both our kids, their spouses and all the grandchildren were here. They showered me with scads of presents. It was a great time."*

Thanks for the great gift of time you gave to us Maurie—you will be missed.

Farm Awarded Ohio Conservation Award

Enterprise Hill Farm, founded by Chase and Betty Heyman (pg. 571-576) in 1956 was recently selected as one of five outstanding family farm operations practicing conservation in the state of Ohio at the September 2003 Farm Science Review held in London, Ohio. This honor, and associated plaque and monetary award, was sponsored by *Ohio Farmer* magazine, the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation, organized by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Division of Soil and Water, and co-sponsored by the Ohio Federation of Soil and Water Districts. The award was featured in an article in *Ohio Farmer* magazine and the Norwalk (Ohio) Reflector.

The Heyman family has been practicing conservation for five generations now, beginning in 1910 when Chase Heyman's maternal grandfather (Edward Miller) started installing tile in the fields to drain the land of excessive water and improve accessibility to the fields. Currently about 80 percent of the land operated by the farm is tiled, according to Kurt Heyman (pg. 571), Chase's son and current Heymann Historical Society Trustee.

Control of water drainage is only one part of the entire conservation picture. Wooded areas owned by the operation are periodically cleared for timber harvesting and different land forms as well as no-till techniques have been used to control soil erosion. Recently, the Heymans have started to employ precision farming techniques utilizing satellite imagery to help limit the use of fertilizer and pesticides to only those areas where they are needed.
