Calvin Heyman taught school until 1897. He married Flora Heyman (page 448) and then engaged in farming and livestock breeding for the remainder of his life. He helped publish the "red book", 1678-1931, distributed at the First Homecoming and Joint Reunion of the descendants of Johann Wilhelm Heymann (John George Heymann, John William Heymann, and William Conrad Heymann), on August 23, 1931. Ethel Heyman, their daughter (page 449) helped her father publish Supplement I, 1931-1940, and Supplement II, 1940-1947 and the 1973 Heymann Genealogy and History, 1630-1973.

Heymann Historical Society Board Meeting February 13, 2005

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 PM. Lou Zorn, David Hyman, William Seaman, Kurt Heyman, William Heiman, Chase Heyman, Elden Plue, Matthew Heyman, Carol Germond, Duane Heyman were present. Ulrike Gapp and Albert Horn Jr. were not present. The minutes of the September 26, 2004 meeting were read. Kurt Heyman presented the Treasurer's report. Other items discussed at the meeting are listed below.

Brick sidewalk Fourteen orders have been received since the 2004 initial installation. A reminder of the order deadline for the 2005 installation will be included in the next newsletter. Pauline Heymann wrote and recommended that a section of the brick sidewalk be made into a special memorial to the four founders, Johann Wilhelm Heymann and his three sons, John George Heymann, John William Heymann and William Conrad Heymann. Elden Plue moved that the four founders' bricks be purchased by the HHS, seconded by David Hyman, and carried unanimously. Memorial for past board members William Seaman will research the past board members and report at the annual 2005 board meeting. A motion was made by Kurt Heyman to purchase bricks for deceased board members of the HHS, seconded by Elden Plue, and passed without dissent. Federal grants William Seaman researched the grant process of the Department of Interior. The deadline for FY2006 is February 1, 2006. Friendship Hall Concerns were voiced regarding the brush on the perimeter of the property. A walk through of the lot will occur at the annual 2005 meeting. Family Trip Jackie Hyman presented some tentative details of the next trip to Germany in summer 2006. More details will be included in the May 2005 newsletter. First organized on August 14, 1858 as the German Evangelical Reformed Church, the congregation moved into a newly built Hunt's Corners Church building in 1866. In 1982 the remaining members of the congregation transferred the deed to the Heymann Historical Society to allow for preservation of the building. On September 2, 1993 the Hunt's Corners district was added to the National Register of Historic Places by the National Park Service, United States Department of the Interior.


